### Lieutenant-Colonel Robert Bunten Muir O.B.E. J.P.

On the 12<sup>th</sup> June 1895, Robert married Alice Katherine Ashton at St Peters, Pimlico.

On the wedding register, it records his address as residing at the Grosvenor Hotel on Buckingham Palace Road in London and her father as Sam Tudor Ashton, a Major in the Leicestershire Yeomanry. (See Bulletin No 2 July 23 for Lieutenant Colonel Sam Tudor Ashton).

Robert Bunten Muir was born on 17 July 1862 at Anderston in Glasgow. He was the youngest of 6 children for Matthew Andrew Muir and his wife Agnes (nee Bunten).

Matthew was a managing partner of the Anderston Foundry Company which produced looms for both cotton and wool and later on also produced chairs for railway carriages. Robert was educated at Cheltenham College.

Robert came to Melton for a week with a view to securing property for the hunting season. He purchased Newport Lodge in February 1889 following the death of millionaire, Mr. Julius Behrens in October 1888.

They were married by the Reverand R Blakeney, Vicar of Melton Mowbray and assisted by the Reverand John Storrs of St Peters.

In 1896, Robert and Alice had a daughter, Agnes Katherine Muir who was born in Brighton and was their only child.

Robert was commissioned into the Leicestershire Yeomanry Cavalry as a 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant in January 1890 and was promoted to Captain on the eve of the Boer War. He served with the 65th Company 17<sup>th</sup> Battalion Leicestershire (Prince Alberts Own) Imperial Yeomanry.

The 65<sup>th</sup> Company was one of the units of the 17<sup>th</sup> Battalion Imperial Yeomanry that sailed as part of the Rhodesian Field Force under the command of Lieutenant-General Sir F Carrington, who incidentally was also educated at Cheltenham College.

Along with the other seven companies comprising the 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> Battalions IY, they set sail on 6<sup>th</sup> April 1900 from Southampton, calling briefly at Tenerife on 12<sup>th</sup> April before sailing directly on to Beira, Portuguese East Africa, now modern day Mozambique. In all, there were 63 officers, 1019 men and 53 horses that sailed aboard the transport ship Galeka.

The 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> Battalions landed at Beira on the 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> of May, joining with other volunteer mounted troops from Australia and New Zealand to form the Rhodesia Field Force.

The 65<sup>th</sup> did not arrive at their base camp at Marandellas until June 7<sup>th</sup>. Whilst at Marandellas, the 65<sup>th</sup> was employed with some British South Africe Police on a small 'expedition' in the North against the native chief M'Pondera. Although the chief escaped, the expedition was deemed as successful and they were recognised for their good work caried out and gallantry displayed by all ranks.

He was awarded the Queen's South Africa 1899-1902 with 3 clasps: Cape Colony, Rhodesia, Orange Free State.

He was also awarded the Melton Mowbray Tribute Medal, Transvaal War in South Africa 1900 - 1901, reverse inscription in raised letters (name, rank and unit engraved), 'Presented by the Town of Melton Mowbray to R. B. Muir in recognition of his Patriotism & Valour in serving in the Transvaal War as Captain in the 65th Com. Imp. Yeo.' Due to Richard being in South Africa, and his expectation of not returning to Melton until March 1901, he let Newport Lodge to Mr & Mrs Foxhall Keene. His wife Alice moved into Northfield House on Scalford Road at the back end of 1900 whilst her horses were located at the stables of Mr. W Payne on Park Road.

At this time, Melton & surrounding area was experiencing a water dilemma with the water at Scalford Spring now being 3ft 5in down the pipe. There was also an issue with air getting into the pipes resulting in poor flow of water. In November 1900, Alice sent a letter to the Urban District Council which was read out by the Chairman at their monthly meeting: "Northfield House, Melton Mowbray, November 27th, 1900. Mrs Muir wishes to draw the attention of the Urban District Council to the great scarcity of water at Northfield House. For days together there has been no supply whatever from the town. Mrs Muir understood that new arrangements for the supply were to have been carried out last October. The scarcity of water here is causing great inconvenience."

Northfield House wasn't the only property affected as the same issue was also reported by Mr Fast who was also experiencing the same at Mowbray Lodge on Dalby Road.

When the 1901 Census was taken on Sunday 31<sup>st</sup> March 1901, Alice was recorded as now residing at Northfield House on Scalford Road.

She was listed as being 29 years old and living on her own means. Also listed was Marjorie, her 4 year old daughter plus Jane MaClean, Edith Whittingham, Annie Dunkley, Jessie Pope and Mark Kellam, all servants.

Richard returned to the UK on 3<sup>rd</sup> June 1901 sailing on The Hawarden Castle and expected to arrive in Southampton on the 25<sup>th</sup>.

Following his return from South Africa, he Commanded the Melton Mowbray 'A' Squadron of the Leicestershire Yeomanry until he resigned his commission on 7<sup>th</sup> January 1905.



In 1910, the Muir family moved from Melton Mowbray and took up residence at Kirby Hall, Kirby Bellars, just outside Melton.

Following the outbreak of World War One, the Regiment was brought up to war establishment which provided for a regimental HQ and three squadrons.

Mobilisation took place at the Squadron Headquarters of A,B and C Squadrons in Melton, Leicester and Loughborough respectively. The

personnel of D Squadron at Lutterworth were distributed between A, B and C Squadrons. The Regiment moved off to Diss in Norfolk until November 2<sup>nd</sup> when they headed over to France under the command of Lt-Col Percy Evans-Freke.

Back in England, the raising of the second- and third-line units synchronised with Lord Kitchener's appeal to the country for a million volunteers. Both units filled guickly and Richard rejoined the Leicestershire Yeomanry in August 1914 taking command of the second line whilst Lt-Col W Byron took command of the third line.

Early in 1916, Richard and the second line moved to the East Coast as part of the force organised against hostile invasion, whilst the third line under Byron moved to the Cavalry Depot at Aldershot where they were involved in training drafts was carried out in conjunction with other regiments.

Later the same year, the second-line unit was dismounted and issued bicycles instead of horses, but they were subsequently remounted. Throughout its existence, the second-line unit was called upon to function both as a complete home defence unit, and at the same time as a draft finding units with drafts being sent not only to the first line but also to other units in all theatres.

Alice was also involved in the Great War effort as she was involved in the collecting eggs for the wounded campaign. The Melton Mowbray Times published on the 16<sup>th</sup> July 1915 reported that so far she had forwarded on 2,025 eggs with the kind assistance of contributors, she hoped she would be sending eggs for some time to come.

During the Great War, Muir attained the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel in the 2/1st Leicestershire Yeomanry, was mentioned in despatches and awarded the O B.E. for his services to the war (London Gazette 3 June 1919).

Richard resided at Kirby Hall, Melton Mowbray, until he died on 6<sup>th</sup> March 1937.

# Melton Sailor Wins Distinguished Service Medal.



The award of the Distinguished Service Medal to Able Seaman William George Edward Burrows C/JX.154411 serving with HMS Pembroke for bravery with the Army was announced in the Melton Times published on 16<sup>th</sup> August 1940.

The "London Gazette" describes the award as "for determination and resource in affecting the rescue of several N.C.O's and men of the 5<sup>th</sup> Battalion King's Own Royal Regiment, when buried in the debris of a bombed house at Dunkirk, an act of bravery which earned special commendation of the Commander in Chief B.E.F."

William Burrows is the son of the late Mr. C. Burrows and Mrs. Burrows of Scalford Lodge, Melton, and attended the Melton Boys Modern School. He was employed by Messrs. D.S.Hayes, the fishmonger in the Market Place until he was sixteen when he expressed a desire to "see the world" and joined the Navy.

First news of his adventures filtered through when it was learned he was on a ship engaged in the Narvik assault during Hitler's invasion of Norway, when although his ship was hit, he survived the adventure.

Now comes the heroic story of his gallantry at Dunkirk, where he landed with a party from the trawler, to help the evacuation, when the German bombers came.

One bomb smashed a house in which the N.C.O's and men of the King's Own Royal Regiment were sitting, says the "Daily Express" account of the incident. "A.B. Burrows ran to the house. Rafters, bricks and floors hung grotesquely, poised insecurely, ready to collapse at the next reverberation.

From within the debris, came the cries of men alive, Englishmen. William Burrows' broad back held up the rafters. His strong feet kicked away the bricks.

His quick eye watched and his skilled hands forestalled each sign of collapse. All the troops were saved. Able Seaman William George Edward Burrows won the personal praise of the B.E.F. Commander in Chief."

The 5th Battalion King's Own Royal Regiment were to retreat to Dunkirk and help form the defensive perimeter around the Port of Dunkirk whilst others were evacuated between 26<sup>th</sup> May and 4<sup>th</sup> June. By 2nd June most of the King's Own men had embarked for England. At 9am on the 4<sup>th</sup> June Dunkirk was surrendered to the Germans.

The battalion was attacked by 24 German aircraft on the 24<sup>th</sup> May. During this attack Drummer J Whitbread fired a Bren gun forcing the aircraft to break formation and desist from their attacks. The next day the decision was made to evacuate the BEF through Dunkirk and the 5<sup>th</sup> Battalion were ordered to hold the line at the River Marcq at Bouvines as part of the 42<sup>nd</sup> Division.
